

Welcome to the Fashion Academy

Nau mai ki te Whare Aronui o Tiriwa. The Fashion Academy welcomes you.

The Fashion Academy includes courses for students in Years 11, 12 and 13. Our aim is to introduce students to the Fashion Industry and to support our students to begin their pathway towards a career in Fashion. Through this handson course, students are taught to operate industrial sewing machines and how to create complete garments. Students will complete multiple sewing projects throughout the course, where they learn to design their own garments and adapt patterns.

Students will gain skills necessary for threading and operating the Industrial Sewing machine and the Industrial Overlocker. Once these skills have been learnt the students will be cutting and sewing several projects including a tailored shirt, a traditional Japanese kimono, a lined skirt, a formal occasion garment, a wrap skirt and two types of bags. Students will have collaborated on a group banner using aspects of visual design and applique fabric techniques.

We have several trips planned throughout the year, including our regular fabric shopping trips and visits to local fashion businesses, all funded by AWVA. Work experience is often offered at the businesses we visit, and all students are encouraged to take part in a work experience placement throughout the year, which they can gain NCEA credits for. We have industry connections with fashion retail, knitwear companies, fabric cutting services, ball gown makers, clothing alteration businesses and more.

Students in the Fashion Academy work towards achieving the Level 2 National Certificate in Clothing Manufacture and a pathway into the Creative Industries. All work completed throughout the course is NCEA accredited, with **46** level 2 credits at Level 1, **57** Level 2 credits and **42** Level 3 credits offered in the main Year 12 and 13 courses.

Our **Year 13 Fashion Academy** students take part in a short course at NZ Fashion Tech over 6 days, where they learn to sew a tailored shirt, pockets, collars, and sleeves. NCEA credits are gained from this course along with an experience of tertiary study. This helps prepare our students for further education in the field. The school covers transport costs for these days. In class the students continue to build their skills by designing and creating a traditional Japanese kimono, a lined skirt, a formal occasion garment of their choice, and a second bag or luggage piece.

The **Year 12 Fashion Academy** begins with an introduction to the plain sewer and overlocking machines, health and safety, plus pattern adaptations. The students then create a wrap skirt of their own design and a bag or luggage item, followed by a garment of their choice.

The **Year 11 Fashion Academy** includes practical sewing skills, basic pattern adaptation and general knowledge of clothing material. This class is also open to those who have not taken Fabric Technology in the past.

All the courses are very practical, and the students are on the sewing machines daily, refining their skills and always learning new ones. Students will leave with up to three years of industrial sewing machine experience, placing them well ahead of other fashion students of the same age group.



Pre-academy Fashion – Level 1, Year 11, (1 hour per day).

This is a skills-based course to prepare those interested in joining the Fashion Academy in Year 11. This course will be one hour a day.

Vocational Pathways Award within the Academies.

All the standards in Academy courses contribute to the NCEA. Students in the academies at Level 2 are also eligible for the Vocational Pathways Award. To get a Vocational Pathways Award, the student must gain Level 2 NCEA with a minimum of 20 Level 2 credits from Sector-Related, (**SR**), standards, (within that sector), and a further minimum of 40 credits from Recommended, (**R**), standards, (also within that sector), to make up a total of 60 pathway credits. (See tables). The SR standards are generally achieved within the academy and the R standards come from some academy standards plus standards in other subjects.

The Vocational Pathways Award enables employers to assess whether potential employees' skills align with their industry requirements more easily. The six Vocational Pathways sectors are: Constructions & Infrastructure (CI), Manufacturing & Technology (MT), Primary Industries (PI), Service Industries (SI), Social & Community Services (SC) and Creative Industries (CR). Note this award only applies to Level 2.

Fees and Transport. Our academy course also involves 6 days at NZ Fashion Tech where the students will be taught by the NZ Fashion Tech tutors and gain credits delivered by this NZQA approved tertiary provider. Transport to and from NZ Fashion Tech is provided free from MHS as are all course fees.



Entry and commitment from students. All students who wish to apply for this

academy should complete an AWVA application form **and indicate their** choice of the Fashion Academy Pathway in the MHS Pathways Booklet. Places will be limited and an interview process will be arranged with the student and their whanau or support person plus the MHS academy tutor. Students will need to be committed to maintaining their attendance at 95% and to getting to NZ Fashion Tech on the designated days.

Course structure. The Pre-Academy is one period per day and the Level 2 and Level 3 Fashion Academies will run two hours a day each day all year in the senior school. The current existing standards are listed in the following tables. (Subject to change).

Individual education plans, IEPs. All students will have regular IEP meetings to check their progress towards their vocational pathways award and/or NCEA.

Preferred subject choices along with Fashion. Preference for Academy places will be given to students who also choose subjects from this list. *English, Mathematics, Art, Digital Design, Photography, Media Studies.*

Students may only select ONE academy.
